Learning and Turning

Two years ago, I saw an item in our Guild newsletter stating that Dennis Harvey taught pen turning classes. Pen turning was something I wanted in my skill set! I called Dennis Harvey and we set a time for me to visit Dennis's shop. Dennis donated a pen kit and we began a day of pen turning. Dennis showed me each step and we discussed the various factors requiring attention such as kit selection, blank selection, turning, CA glue application, polishing, and pen assembly. Dennis really enjoys his time in the shop (as we all do) and we lost

track of time. I went home with a new pen for my family to admire.

Dennis's wife even provided lunch!

I returned a couple weeks later for a more detailed session with Dennis teaching me about turning more complex pens and synthetic blanks. We discussed the need for lighting and Dennis taught me to read the reflection lines to achieve a uniform finish.

Moldable Wood

As woodworkers, we know from experience that wood is an exceptionally versatile material. Familiar to mankind for thousands of years, wood has typically been shaped by mechanical processes such as sawing, carving or turning and made into complex structures by joinery. Now, however, in the cover article of the October 22 issue of Science, Professor Lianbing Hu at the University of Maryland and his collaborators describe a process for making moldable wood. In brief, the process involves partially removing lignin – the cell walls inside wood that give it strength – from hardwood, then drying, followed by a "water shock" treatment. The process modifies the hardwood cells such that the resulting material can be easily bent, twisted or folded both along and across the grain - essentially making a highly flexible material. Once shaped, the material is set by air drying. The resulting product is stronger than the raw wood. When fabricated into a honeycomb structure, the structure can hold about 1500 times its own weight. The process is expected to be commercially scalable and environmentally friendly and sustainable. The authors predict that moldable wood products will compete with plastics and some metals, such as aluminum, in a variety of applications.
