I will maintain and expand the Guild's association with fellow woodworking entities, and promote the Guild to the public wherever possible.


The year is off to a good start. If we all pledge to participate more, it will be a great year for the Guild.

Q. TELL US ABOUT YOURSELF: HOMETOWN, BACKGROUND, EDUCATION, PROFESSION, AND OTHER INTERESTS.

I was born in Washington, D.C. and grew up in Charles County, MD, outside of La Plata. I graduated from La Plata High School in 1980. I later moved to Bowie, MD, where I now reside with my wife, Laura. I have a grown son, Billy, who is married and lives in Eastport with his wife, Meaghan. After a series of jobs, I started a career at Capital Ink, now Flint Ink, a printing ink manufacturer. There, I formulated inks, color matched inks, ran clients' on-site ink rooms, and provided technical support to clients. I am currently retired on

disability, initially due to a back injury. I have a lifelong passion for music, and play guitar and a several other instruments.

Q. HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN INTERESTED IN WOODWORKING?

I have always been curious about woodworking and carving. My mother had a several pieces of antique furniture, one of which was a chair with some carvings including ball and claw feet. I always wondered how they were made and carved but I did not think I could ever be able to do anything like that. About 20 years ago, my wife signed both of us up for a beginner sign carving class in Virginia. After this class I got the bug for wood carving. Shortly after that class, some childhood friends' fathers and I started the Southern Maryland Wood Carving Club.

Q. YOU ARE A WONDERFUL CARVER. COULD YOU EXPLAIN HOW YOU GOT STARTED?

Thank you for the compliment. The initial wood carving class got me started. The Southern Maryland Wood Carvers and fellow carvers kept me inspired and carving.

Q. TELL US ABOUT YOUR EXPERIENCES WITH OUR GUILD.

I have met a lot of likeminded individuals, and learned a lot from the Guild. I am amazed at all the talent and how much there is to learn about woodworking. The monthly guest speakers are my favorite part of the meetings. Although I have not been doing much woodworking or carving in the last few years, I look forward to the meetings each month.

Q. WHAT GOT YOU INTERESTED IN WOODWORKING?

Woodcarving also led to learning and an interest in woodworking, due to building pieces to carve. Then I started to branch out into making and carving boxes and other things. A few years after, I found out about the AWG and joined.



Q. WHAT ARE YOUR FAVORITE WOODWORKING PROJECTS?

I have two favorite woodworking projects. The first is a relief carving from the book, Where the Wild Things Are. It was carved in a piece of mahogany that came from an old friend who had just passed away. This project was one of the first projects I carved. It taught me a lot about carving and how to work with grain direction and wood. This took about a year off and on to complete. The second favorite is an 8-string bass I made and carved a relief scene on. I love this. It looks good, it is something I can play, and it sounds good. Disclaimer: I bought the individual pieces of the guitar: body, neck, etc., but I did all the assembly (routing, drilling, string spacing, electronics, etc.), setup, and tuning.





Q. HAVE YOU RECEIVED AWARDS OR RECOGNITIONS FOR ANY OF YOUR WOODWORKING PROJECTS? IF SO, WHAT WERE THEY FOR AND BY WHOM?

When I first started carving, I entered some local carving competitions with the carving club and received some ribbons. I did not enter very many of these competitions. My most surprising recognition was when Tommy Mac, of Rough Cut Woodworking, saw my carvings on the AWG display at the Timonium Woodworking Show a few years ago and offered to buy three of them.

Q. WHAT OR WHO HAS INFLUNCED YOUR WOODWORKING INTEREST?

Nature, history, music and my imagination have influenced my woodworking interests. Sam Maloof, George Nakashima, Wharton Esherick and Jim Luck are woodworkers that I greatly admire.

Q. WHAT WOODWORK-ING PUBLICATIONS DO YOU READ, AND WHICH ONE DO YOU REFER TO MOST OF-TEN?

Q. DESCRIBE YOUR WORKSHOP: LOCATION, SIZE, POWER TOOLS, IMPORTANT HAND TOOLS, JIGS COMMONLY USED. IS THERE ANYTHING UNUSUAL ABOUT YOUR SHOP?

I have a very small shop in our townhouse dining room. I have a drafting table that I use to carve. Because of my bad back, I can't bend over. I have made jigs that fit on the drafting table to hold the various pieces at different angles, so that I can carve. I have a work bench I made out of an old kitchen cabinet to plane, sand, and finish, and for other assembly. I have a 14- inch band saw and shelving that holds various hand tools and supplies. I have a weakness for antique hand tools and layout tools. My wife wants me to go to counseling for this.

Q. WHAT ELSE GIVES YOU GREAT JOY?

Music give me joy. Listening to music and playing the guitar and other instruments relaxes me and

GUILD INTERESTS

AWG Training Award Program

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION: Periodically thoughout the calendar year (approximately 2 times a year), a ticket will be issued to those AWG members wishing to participate in a special drawing. The winner will receive \$500 dollars to be used solely for training purposes <u>in a woodworking area of their choice</u>.

• Entry into the drawing is free. Entries will be issued during a general meeting or if, unable to attend, an AWG member can e-mail an entry to the President. At the AWG General Membership meeting in July, a winner will be randomly selected. Only one ticket per active member will be issued. At the time of entry, you must show your active AWG membership card. If your card is not available, the AWG Treasurer will verify his/her active membership.

Winner do not have to be present to win.

Winner cannot sell or transfer the award.

The money can only be used for woodworking training purposes <u>to provide</u> the Guild Member the opportunity to enhance his or her present woodworking <u>skills</u>. It cannot be used for tool purchases, airfare, food or lodging. The award dollars will not be issued to the winner but instead sent directly to the school or training facility where the course is conducted. In the event a winner cancels the course for whatever reason, the money will revert back to the fund.

Winner has one year to spend the money. All or any unused portion of the prize goes back to the Endowment Fund after one year. The AWG Treasurer shall keep records.

The winner, after training completion, is required to brief AWG at a general meeting on the <u>course taken</u>, <u>item produced and lessons/benefits</u> received from the course.

Entry period for this drawing will begin June 9 and end at the July 14, 2016 meeting.

Mehogany, Tropical American, "Hondures" (Swietenia macrophylia)




