ADDITIONALLY, THE FOUNDERY WAS EASY TO FIND WITH THE GPS. THIS IS AN OP-PORTUNITY TO USE GREAT WOODWORKING EQUIPMENT SUCH AS THEIR 16" JOINTER AND LARGE PLANER FOR A MODEST \$10.00 DAILY FEE.

Q HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN INTERESTED IN WOODWORKING?




Q WHAT WOODWORKING PUBLICATIONS DO YOU READ, AND WHICH ONE DO YOU PREFER?



Duncan Adams








