Experienced Sawdust with Chris Desaultes

Q TELL US ABOUT YOURSELF: HOMETOWN, BACKGROUND, EDUCATION, PROFESSION, AND OTHER INTERESTS.

I'm from upstate New York, the Finger Lakes area, but I've lived in the DC area since 1987. Prior to that I moved around a lot, living in Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Connecticut, and Europe (Luxembourg).



I received a degree in Photo Illustration from the Rochester Institute of Technology, but I haven't done photography in years. I became involved with the internet when it was just beginning to get going in the mid 90's, and never looked back. I now build and maintain web applications for the Federal Government.

My interests included a martial art called Aikido which I did for over 3 decades and reached a pretty high rank: 5th degree black belt. But I've recently retired from that practice and now my interests are limited to woodworking and golf. I also love dogs, German Shepherds in particular. We lost our previous German Shepherd to old age last January and are down to only one dog right now, a Cattle Dog mix, which is pretty unusual for my wife and I. We're waiting to get a German Shepherd puppy from a particularly good breeder we know. We currently have a magnificent Golden Retriever service dog in training in our house. But that's a temporary situation. My wife trains service dogs, and once this one reaches a certain level of behavioral excellence he'll be returned to the organization to commence his advanced training and then begin his career with a suitable human companion.

Q HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN INTERESTED IN WOODWORKING?

I've been doing woodworking since about 1997, shortly after we moved into our current house.

Q. WHAT GOT YOU INTERESTED IN WOODWORKING?

A lot of folks have stories of how their father or an uncle got them started, but no such thing for me. My father was a talented engineer, but getting him to do something around the house was like pulling teeth.

For me, shortly after we moved into our current house, I visited a friend who had a pretty extensive woodshop in his basement, and I was intrigued. I started slow, with a few cheap tools and not a clue about what I was doing, but I was hooked and just kept going.

Q. WHAT ARE YOUR FAVORITE WOODWORKING PROJECTS?

I like to build furniture. Lately, I've been really into building chairs: Windsor and Maloof rockers. I really enjoy the complexity and the handwork involved. But my next big project will probably be a hutch for our dining room, which will very likely be walnut with inlay of holly or maple.

Q. WHAT OR WHO HAS INFLUENCED YOUR WOODWORKING INTEREST?

I don't follow any particular style and I usually work from my own designs. Most people think my furniture has a Scandinavian or Shaker flavor to it: simple clean lines, limited ornamentation.

I prefer to use domestic species, and when I can get it, I like to use locally harvested wood. I will occasionally use exotic woods, but not very much. It's mostly for reasons of ecological responsibility. For the same reasons, I'm very particular about wood finishing. I have zero tolerance for toxic finishing materials, and rarely, if ever, stain any of my pieces.

Q WHAT WOODWORKING PUBLICATIONS DO YOU READ, AND WHICH ONE DO YOU PREFER?

Fine Woodworking magazine and various books.

Q. ARE YOU DOING ANYTHING SPECIAL NOW THAT GIVES YOU GREAT JOY?

I'm building a dining room table for a friend. He owns about 70 acres of woodland in Vermont, and he harvests lumber from it for local contractors. He harvested a pile of birch to make a dining room table for his son, but he doesn't know how to build furniture, so he kept calling me with questions. After about the 6th call, I told him to just bring the wood to me and I'd build the table. He thought that was too much to ask, but I told him that, "I just love building stuff, but I'm running out of room to put it. So you would be doing me a favor". Besides, he brings me wood from Vermont and sells it to me for crazy low prices, so it's a pleasure to finally do him a favor.

It's going to be quite a table. When the wood is free, one tends , and I told him, "Oh yeah, you're going to be there. I'm not horsing that thing around by myself".

Q DESCRIBE YOUR WORKSHOP (LOCATION, SIZE, POWER TOOLS, IMPORTANT HAND TOOLS, JIGS COMMONLY USED), AND IF THERE IS ANYTHING UNUSUAL ABOUT YOUR SHOP?

My shop is in my basement and it's small but well equipped. Hand tools are too numerous to list, and my collection is mostly very high-quality items. I'm kind of obsessed with tool quality having wasted money over the years on tools I only ended up replacing. I learned the hard way that in the long run cheap tools do not save any money, and I will defer acquiring a tool if I have to in order to get the right one.

I also have a pretty complete assortment of large power equipment, which is easier to list. Most of these I researched extensively before purchasing them. My goal these days is basically to never have the urge to replace a tool ever again.


Cherry Chest of Drawers


Phil Christenson won the Big Raffle. A Ridgid Oscillating Edge/Belt Spindle Sander.








IN HOME SHOW & TELL
