# Guest Speaker for June Mike J. Colella

Michael J. Colella always wanted to learn photography but it wasn't until his 2nd year at Frosttburg State College that he took a photo class and that was the catalyst that unlocked the artist within. After college his first job was in high school in Wheaton, MD that had a wood shop with every tool known to man. The shop teacher told him to feel free to come down anytime and that he did. Growing



up, his dad was always making things with wood, so the interest was there. The lathe was of interest so that is what he learned first and was hooked. Unfortunately wood turning would have to take a back seat to a growing photography interest and a new house and children.

Leaving that first job to become a full time photographer was a big step, but he never looked back. Creating photos around DC and around the world was what he did, and still does in between turning sessions. Being a photographer was not just about making pictures, but creating beautiful images, whether they were bridal portraits or ads for Italian wines, they were small works of art.

With the kids all grown and moved out and digital photography taking a different direction, there was time to do something else. Upon seeing some exotic turnings at a local craft show that interest in woodturning was rekindled and like photography, has never looked back.

First he joined Capital Area Woodturners which helped jump start the learning and then became a charter member of Montgomery County Woodturners in Rockville MD. Woodworking for Michael is kind of like B & W photography, you find the subject, take the picture, developed the film, then print the final image. Now his subjects are found wood, everywhere, even in people's firewood pile. It gets developed on the lathe and finally finished with some surface treatment. The image is born. That's where the business name came from; he was looking at a fallen log in the park and thought, they're all "sleeping beauties", just waiting to be awakened and turned into objects of beauty.

In 2013 Michael was accepted as a guest artist at the Maryland Renaissance Festival where his wood items would become a big hit. Three years later both Michael and his wife Sue became permanent artists at the festival in their booth called Sleeping Beauties. The festival runs weekends from August 25th thru October 21st this year. Aside from bowls and other turned wood items, his specialty at the festival has become custom magic wands for all ages. Michael will talk about how he takes found wood and turns them into objects of beauty.






Mike Mantich won the Lowe's \$50.00 gift card


Jim Francis made a scroll & ribbon tray at the School of Annapolis Woodworks.
