



AWG President's Message by Bob Ashby

- 1. Always do the best work you can do with what you have. If you are building a fine cabinet build the best one you can. If you are building a crate build the best crate you can.
- 2. Learn to fix your mistakes. Everyone who makes things also makes mistakes. The best way to get better at fixing errors is to make a problem up and practice fixing it. In the process make sure you ask others how they would attack the problem. Two to one someone else has already encountered the same situation.
- 3. Be able to make jigs. Personally, if I am going to make more than two of something I'll be making a jig somewhere to assure results are consistent. I'll also make a jig any time multiple parts need to be the same. I'll make a "Go-No Go" jig to check the work accuracy of others. Jigs can be as simple as the ones shown at our last meeting, or can be as complicated as one I know about that took a sheet of ply, eight four-inch casters, a couple of eight foot 2x4's, a 16 inch table saw, 3 men, some clamps and a forklift! No matter what, build your jigs the best you can and build them to last.


Annual AWG Dues

Gears, levers, pulleys, Oh My! Chuck Beaver has gone kinetic!





Adam Schmitt shows a wonderful historically accurate model of the original Davidsonville Methodist Church that he constructed.


















Upcoming Classes
