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

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS WITH KARL HOKE OUR AWG TREASURER

Q. TELL US ABOUT YOURSELF: HOMETOWN, BACKGROUND, EDUCATION, PROFESSION, AND OTHER INTERESTS.

My hometown is Millersburg, PA. I graduated from Penn State University with B.Sc and Iowa State University M.Sc in Animal Husbandry and Food Science. My career was with US Dept. of Agriculture,



Washington, DC, for 36 years. I was involved in a wide variety of research studies in Animal and Food Technology and Marketing, often with Land Grant Universities which entailed world travel. Studies included developing US Grade Standards for livestock and meat, export marketing, transportation, refrigeration, and quality control. International projects were developed with France, Netherlands, Germany, Australia, Taiwan, Korea, Philippines and Venezuela.

Q. WHAT GOT YOU INTERESTED IN WOODWORKING? HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN INTERESTED IN WOODWORKING?

I liked being creative and working with my hands. Ever since I got involved in the 7th grade with Industrial Arts classes, which is over 70 years.

Q. WHAT DID YOU EXPECT FROM THE GUILD AND DID WE AS A GUILD MEET YOUR EXPECTATIONS?

When to I moved to BayWoods of Annapolis, a retirement community, J.J. Smith, a past President of the Guild, invited me to work with him to develop the woodshop at BayWoods. I was able to bring many of my tools and equipment to add to the shop. He also introduced me to the Guild.





WINE CHEST

Q. WHAT ARE YOUR FAVORITE WOOD-WORKING PROJECTS?

Working with chestnut lumber obtained from a rural schoolhouse and two barns. In the early years I made bookcases, stair railing, cabinets, and chestnut paneling for a cabin. In the 1960s and 70s I made furniture for my home—tables, desk, and cabinets from walnut and cherry. 1998 I made a chestnut colonial hutch. Recently I made a country-style dining table and bench with butterfly keys, a wine cabinet to house 24 bottles, and a jewelry cabinet.

Q. HAVE YOU RECEIVED AWARDS OR RECOGNITIONS FOR ANY OF YOUR WOODWORKING PROJECTS? IF SO, WHAT WERE THEY FOR AND FROM WHOM?

Most of my projects were for family and friends. BayWoods of Annapolis honored me with a brass plaque for my leadership with a retired Naval Architect to design and oversee the building of a 700-foot Ipe boardwalk connecting the BayWoods main building to the Chesapeake Bay waterfront. My greatest satisfaction is obtained from family members and others who appreciate my wood - working skills for useful items or repairs.

Q. WHAT OR WHO HAS INFLUNCED YOUR WOODWORKING INTEREST?

The Industrial Arts classes from 7th grade through high school provided me with excellent teachers. A school board member recognized my interest and offered me to apprentice at his shop after school and on weekends. In my senior year of high school, I obtained the lumber from a large cherry log felled by a road crew. Several local sawmills provided the means for sawing logs into lumber. I built a cherry cedar chest and several bookcases.

Q. ARE YOU DOING ANYTHING SPECIAL NOW THAT GIVES YOU GREAT JOY?

Building a walnut and butternut chest of drawers with hand dovetail joints. Also making toy golf carts with other residents for charity and for gifts.

In the past few years I have done furniture restoration, including clocks, bellows, chairs, and a whiskey chest. Also, I was commissioned to make two teak end tables for one of our residents.

Q. WHAT WOOD-WORKING PUBLICA-TIONS DO YOU READ AND WHICH ONE DO YOU REFER TO MOST OFTEN?

I am a charter subscriber to Fine Woodworking and have collected a library of reference books.

Q. YOU DO A REALLY FINE JOB AS TREAS-URER. CAN YOU WANT TO TELL US A LITTLE ABOUT THAT JOB?

As treasurer I collect dues and monies for events like the Christmas party. I make Board- approved payments such as hall rental, bills for education programs and other special projects. I prepare a monthly financial statement on Excel, maintain paper records in log books, prepare state and federal tax statements and maintain bank accounts. The First National Bank for our checking account has a convenient branch for me, located across the hall from the wood shop where I spend many hours most days.

Q. DESCRIBE YOUR WORKSHOP AT BAYWOODS, LOCATION, SIZE, POWER TOOLS, IMPORTANT HAND TOOLS, JIGS COMMONLY USED AND IS THERE ANYTHING UNUSAL ABOUT YOUR SHOP?

The BayWoods shop is 36 x 29 feet. It is located on the first floor of the central clubhouse area and has access from the adjacent parking garage. A cage area for lumber storage is located in the parking garage. The shop was developed by J.J. Smith and myself. It is climate controlled with air conditioning and heating. A central dust collection system is activated when a machine is turned on. Equipment includes: 10" table saw, 14" planer, 6" jointer, DW chop saw, 2 drill presses, router table, 2 lathes, 14" band saw, bench grinder, 3 belt sanders, 3 routers, 2 portable vacuums, and many hand tools and accessories for the power machinery. All tools and machinery were donated by J.J. Smith, myself, and other residents. I believe



the BayWoods woodshop is the finest shop in retirement communities nearby.

Q. WE KNOW YOU WERE PART OF THE GROUP FROM OUR GUILD THAT MADE BIRD HOUSES THAT CHILDREN COULD PUT TOGETHER. WOULD YOU TELL US ABOUT THAT EXPERIENCE?

The group of enthusiastic BayWoods retirees assisted in cutting the parts for the bluebird houses. Last year a 91- year- old resident delighted in participating. This month, I am enjoying working with new residents who want to work in the shop. One of our projects is completing about 40 toy golf carts for charity and for donations from residents who request this toy. For several years I participated in a local elementary school craft fair where children were allowed to make creative things with wood scraps.


Item Request for Timonium Woodworking Show.



Mentor List



Oak, Red (plain sawn) (Quercus rubra)



Red Oak is one the most abundant of our domestic hardwoods. It is open grained and in its plain sawn form expresses a very strong "Cathedral" type grain pattern. The heartwood is reddish tan to brown and very uniform in color. Its sapwood is lighter in color. Red Oak is also available rift sawn which produces a very uniform straight grained effect. It is also quarter-sawn producing a straight grain but with the "flake" of the medullary ray accented.
